

Saving our Species and Landcare

Partnering to boost success

Saving our Species is a movement, led by the NSW Government, which brings together volunteers, scientists, businesses and community groups like Landcare.

The way the program works is simple – we combine science and research, and on-ground practical actions to make a positive difference for the future of our threatened species.

Our projects are designed by threatened species experts. These are then delivered locally, sometimes through partnerships with Landcare and other groups, to share expertise and costs.



Saving our Species partners with 25 Landcare groups to deliver 16 projects across NSW.



They target habitat in national parks and on private land.



After partners take action on the ground, Saving our Species monitors to see how species respond.



The projects aim to improve habitat and control key threats.

Saving our Species works with eight Landcare groups to increase habitat for vulnerable superb parrots and protect trees with large hollows for nesting.

Saving our Species partners with Mid Lachlan Landcare to help farmers protect box gum grassy woodland, a threatened ecological community.

Saving our Species is partnering with Big Scrub Landcare on the Science Saving Rainforests project, conserving threatened lowland rainforests in the NSW North Coast and Sydney Basin.
